# **Highway Dept. News**

Work has begun on the **Little Mohawk Road** improvements thanks to a nearly \$1 million MassWorks state grant. Trees have been removed, and the Highway Dept. has replaced some culverts and continues to do shoulder work in preparation when the contractors come in to do the bulk of the project. No exact contractor start date has been established, but it's expected to be very soon. Once the contractors begin, people should expect delays, including workday long closures along certain sections of the project area. The Highway Dept. will do its best to keep the public informed via signage during construction. It is advised to refrain from all unnecessary travel on Little Mohawk Road (including pedestrians) throughout the construction period. Thank You for your cooperation.

# **How Do Emergency Services in Shelburne Work?**

Here is one story, sent in by a grateful resident, with response from one EMT:

To the Editor: Just before Christmas, I slipped and fell so hard I didn't know if my injuries were too serious for me to safely move. I was very frightened. I managed to get to my cell phone and call 911. Help came fast, and from the dispatcher and the first person through the door the help was competent, caring and kind. You can read the letter below to see how many dedicated members of our community came to my aid. I felt very safe in their hands. I think it says a lot that my large dog, who is a rescue and very protective, understood right away that these were good people who were there to help me.

I am so very grateful for all the help I was given. Thanks in part to their work I am fully healed now without any significant lingering consequences. We are lucky to live in a community where people dedicate themselves, both as workers and as volunteers, to ensuring that every one of us can get help if and when we need it.

**Ginna:** I would like to thank you for your kind words and provide some of the details that you were wondering about. I was one of many people that represent several agencies that respond to your 911 call on that icey morning in December. The 911 call went into "Shelburne Control" the regional 911 dispatch center. The 911 dispatchers are trained to handle a wide array of calls for assistance including medical calls where they provide pre arrival instructions on how to handle and help during medical emergencies. On taking your call they then dispatched the Shelburne Fire Department who were the first folks to arrive at your house.

Chief John Taylor of the Shelburne Fire Department was the first to arrive and began to administer care. Myself and Carl Davis, also members of the department, responded as well. Given the icy conditions I contacted the Shelburne Highway Department to send a sander over to sand your driveway and stairs which they were happy to help. AMR Ambulance out of Greenfield who is the ambulance service that covers Rural Shelburne responded and I do know that the Paramedic on duty that morning was Jim Nicholson but I can't recall who his partner was that morning.

You were not the only person that morning that had fallen do to the ice throughout Franklin County if that is of some comfort. I am glad that you are healing well and wish you a safe and healthy spring. Again thanks for the kind words and I have included on this email some of the folks that were involved that morning. # Open Space Committee: Guided Hike to Shelburne's <u>Hidden Sandy Beaches</u> — July 9, 9:00 AM, meet at Arms Library & then a short drive to trailhead.

Guided Mohican-Mohawk Trail Hike - The Shelburne Open Space Committee, Arms Library, and Deerfield River Watershed Association have partnered to lead a scenic and educational hike to Shelburne's hidden sandy beaches on the Deerfield River. A former Forester/Natural Resource Specialist will lead the hike through a long-abandoned tree nursery, along a forested ridge high above the Deerfield River, down many steps, and to the river through fields where we will discover small, sandy beaches. These are among the very few sandy beaches to be found along the Deerfield River system and are prized by sunbathers and swimmers. If the group is up to it, we will hike further to a boat put-in and fishing area. What to Bring: Hikers should wear good walking sneakers or hiking boot and long pants; and, bring plenty of water to drink, a snack, sunscreen, and tick repellant or tick treatment. (The best tick treatment is to pretreat your clothing with **Permethrin**.) What to Know: There are two fairly steep slopes, uneven but smooth rocks to walk on along the river, a section of trail runs about 15 feet back from a cliff edge, and there are many wooden steps to go up and down on a fairly steep slope. Hikers should have a medium level of skill and endurance for this 1 ½ mile round trip hike. The hike will most likely take approximately two hours. Where to Meet: We will first gather on the steps of the Shelburne Falls Arms Library at 9:00 AM on Saturday, July 9th. From there we will all drive to the Mohican-Mohawk trailhead located on the Franklin Land Trust property, a roadside pull-out and trailhead adjacent to Route 2, between the State Patrol Barracks and Aubuchon Hardware. 
# **Shelburne Cultural Council surveys Mohawk Trail Regional School students**

# From the FRCOG Public Health Team: Summer Outdoor Food Safety

Ah, summer! An excellent time for barbecues, picnics, hiking and boating. There are many outdoor eating opportunities with family and friends—and the last guest you want to invite is food borne illness. Clean your hands, utensils and surfaces with soap and water, then follow these tips to keep food safe:

- Separate raw meat and poultry—and the plates and utensils that touch them—from other foods. Avoid cross-contamination with raw meats by using clean knives and cutting boards for produce and other foods.
- Keep hot food in crock-pots or ovens and serve small amounts more frequently.
- Be chill: Avoid leaving food at room temperature for longer than 2 hours (or 1 hour, if over 90°F. Instead, keep food in an insulated cooler with ice or ice packs (ice above and below food is best).
- When in doubt, toss it out: All foods left without temperature control for 1 hour or more and have reached room temperature should not be served to you or your guests.

Getting food poisoning from unsafe food may take hours to days to develop, depending on the type of germ. The most common symptoms food poisoning include upset stomach, stomach cramps, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea and fever. See a doctor you have severe symptoms, including but not limited to, a fever over 102°F, bloody diarrhea, frequent vomiting that prevents keeping liquids down, and signs of dehydration, including a very dry mouth or throat or little/no urination. If you've been diagnosed with food borne illness, please contact your local health department.

Walk-in wellness hours: A reminder that walk-in wellness hours in West County are open to the entire community, no appointment needed: FRCOG public health nurses will be in Shelburne Falls at the Senior Center from 10:30-12pm on the 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday of the month; in Charlemont at the Federated Church the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday 10:30am – 12:30pm and the 3<sup>rd</sup> Tuesday 4-5:30pm, during the Good Neighbors Food Distribution; at Conway Town Hall the first Friday of every month from 9am-12pm; and at Ashfield's First Congregational Church during the first food pantry distribution each month from 3-5pm (next up are July 12<sup>th</sup>, August 9<sup>th</sup>, and September 6<sup>th</sup>).

Confidential services include blood pressure and blood glucose checks, support with managing chronic health conditions and self-management of medications, sharps disposal and container exchange. # **Town Meeting Wrap Up:**

The annual Shelburne town meeting convened outdoors again on Saturday, June 11 at 10am at the BSE Bandshell and didn't adjourn until mid-afternoon! Thanks to the 80+ voters who attended, and to our Town Administrator, Terry Narkewicz for procuring a tent and to the volunteers who helped set up and break down.

We approved \$4,874,253 in Shelburne spending toward a total FY 2023 town budget of \$5,425,069 and started the year with a healthy reserve balance in stabilization of \$312,263. We approved 32 of 34 warrant articles and passed over 2 articles. Article 15 requested \$22,500 for a solar powered message board, but we didn't need it because the Highway Dept. was successful in securing a grant for that. We passed over the final Article 34 because it made more sense to consider that next year, if the Community Preservation Act passes at the November elections.

Among the highlights of articles approved:

- We accepted gifts of land and easements at the **Potholes** from the Mills Falls Residencies. This will clarify ownership of the overlook deck and help the town maintain and beautify the area.
- We authorized the Select Board to negotiate a lease with Ancient Glacier LLC to create a **public park** on the former Singley Furniture building lot on the corner of Bridge St. and Deerfield Ave.
- We approved the first step in adopting the **Community Preservation Act** and put it on the ballot for wider voter consideration at the November elections. If voters approve, we will voluntarily accept a surcharge of 3% of our property taxes (cost to average home is \$93 per year) to earn state matching dollars to fund open space, recreation, historic preservation and community housing projects we approve at town meeting. Low income property owners and low/mod income seniors exempted. First \$100,000 in property value also exempted.
